



We had three off –line meetings, all three held under trees to appreciate the blessings of trees. During the Season of Creation the entire school daily recited a prayer for the environment. Special school assembly was held on 4th October highlighting the role played by the patron of the environment. On 2nd October children participated in a small cleanliness drive programme - some within the campus and others outside the school. They were

enthusiastic about it.

So far, the small club has distributed 137 cloth bags for grocery shopping. Students are maintaining a journal in which they enter what they do on a daily basis. They write also their own reflections on their experience. The meetings begin with a sharing of some significant experience and their reflections.



All attended the webinar on 'Mary Ward Family Living Laudato Si' held on 3rd Nov. In Nov. - Dec. we held only one meeting in school during which Mrs. Ruchi Chiller discussed with the group the JPIC resolutions of the Delhi Province. Our Eco-Friends Bulletin Board has all of them displayed.

The Eco-Friends WhatsApp group is active and engaging. Recently some of the members made nests for birds and did attract birds/ small animals. Some did their own little researches about how to make the nests, the disappearing species, and what more they should do to care for birds and animals. WhatsApp group carried several pictures and interesting conversations besides photos of their home gardens.

Some students also tried to make their own compost. Here is an extract from Sadhana's (Cl 6). 'I made natural compost using simple things. Usually, my mother throws away the kitchen

waste such as vegetable peals into the waste bin. I was inspired by Vani Moorthy. I too made compost with the kitchen waste. Yesterday (2nd Dec.) I used it for a dying plant. Now the plant is growing well. I was happy I saved a dying plant. I will inspire more people to make this compost and I will tell them how to make it. It takes only a month.'

Mrs. R. Chiller had also created an adapted version of the Water Audit suitable for our rural children and 45 of them participated.

The Club is making a positive impact among students that 11 more have applied for membership. Our regularity and close monitoring is somewhat disturbed by the on and off lockdown.

In our monthly club meeting, the Laudato Si' goals were once again reminded to the students by Sr. Tomsy. Sr. Merlin encouraged whole hearted participation of the teachers and the students in caring for mother earth.

The International Day of Peace was observed on 21st September. A minute' silence was





observed and prayers were offered for peace in the world. The students wrote slogans and made posters on the importance of peace. In the meeting held on 30thSeptember, the students were informed about the Catholic Church in

India celebrating the Girl Child Day on 8th September, the birthday of our Blessed Mother and also the importance to treat

men and women equally. An assembly which was prepared prior to the meeting was shown to the students.

In our monthly meeting held in the month of October, Students were encouraged to celebrate an Eco –friendly Diwali.

A workshop was conducted by Ms. P. C. Reshmi (Art Teacher) to teach the students eco-friendly ways to decorate their houses. She demonstrated how to make a dream catcher using embroidery rings, pistachio shells and dry flowers and leaves. Students were asked to use lamps(diyas) made out of clay instead of plastic lights, rangolis to be made with fresh flower petals, plates made with plantain leaves to serve guests, indoor plants to be gifted to visitors and so on. An Eco-friendly Diwali pledge was taken by the students. On 24th October U.N Day was



observed and the students were told about its importance.

The topic of the JPIC meeting conducted in the month of November was SHARING AND CARING. Christmas which is celebrated in the month of December, is a festival of 'Sharing and Caring' and to inculcate this sentiment among our students, the JPIC Club members were asked to

- Share a cooked meal with the less privileged or anyone who they felt needed to be fed. •
- Share something useful (clothes etc) and therefore caring for them.
- Share a sapling from their garden in a small give away pot with anyone who they care for or to whom they would want to make a difference with a personalized note.

Special Effort: -Our school has adopted a village KICHRIPUR JJ COLONY. A few students and teachers along with our JPIC facilitators visited this slum as part of our Christmas outreach programme. This was a small initiative through which our students became aware of their surrounding conditions.
